Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth Klafter

As the secular calendar turns to a new year, we will celebrate the last night of Chanukah, concluding the first of two Chanukah festivals falling in 2025. (Chanukah falls again on December 14-22, 2025) And with the end of Chanukah, we mark the first day of the Hebrew month, Rosh Hodesh, of Tevet.

On Rosh Hodesh Tevet in the Hebrew year 5596, December 27, 1935, a candle was lit to honor Rabbi Regina Jonas. In Germany, Jonas was the first woman in Jewish history

to be ordained a rabbi. In 1942, she and her mother were deported to Terezin. There she served the needs of the Jewish community as their rabbi, offering pastoral care and teaching. She was murdered two years later in 1944. As we light the last candles of Chanukah this year, also on the first day of Tevet, we honor her memory, for the light she brought to others at this darkest of times in our people's history. For this is the message of this month.

"During the month of Tevet," writes my colleague and teacher, Rabbi Dalia Marx, PhD, in her book, <u>From Time to Time: Journeys in the Jewish Calendar</u>, "which begins with the shortest days and longest nights of the year, it is good to recall that 'there will not be a victory of light over darkness as long as we do not recognize the clear and simple truth that we must enhance the light rather than fight the darkness' (A. D. Gordon). Even a small candle can expel great darkness."

Tevet arrives at the very heart of winter and darkness. It also marks the beginning of longer days. Marx expresses so poignantly: "It is similar to reaching the bottom of a deep body of water and pushing off the ground to propel oneself back toward the air and light; we know light is coming, even in this darkest of months. After all, it is always darkest before the dawn."

I find particular significance that 2025 begins with all the flames of Chanukah candles filling our menorahs and our homes. Despite the darkness some may feel at this season, our Jewish tradition reminds us to embrace hope, warmth, and light.

Clergy Reflections by

Dear Friends,

Just as on the Jewish New Year when we not only look forward but also look back on the year that has passed, so it is at this season. We anticipate a new President and a very different government, and we imagine what our future will be from a national and international perspective. Our families constantly change and for many of us, we have exciting simchas that we look forward to.

At the same time, we think about the year that has passed. This has been a difficult time for the Jewish people. Antisemitism is more rampantly overt than any time I have ever personally witnessed. Israel, with all its imperfections, is still our beloved homeland, and we are at war on multiple fronts.

Many of us have also suffered personal loss. Sudden illness may have shaken our sense of security and awakened us to the fragility of life and its transient nature.

This past week my voice teacher and friend who many of you may remember, passed away. Teresa Arrigo and I shared duet on Yom Kippur for so many years, but more than that she was a long-time teacher, mentor and second mother to me. I share an excerpt of the words that I spoke at her funeral service only days ago.

We pay tribute to a bright light and a great talent – a gifted teacher who was a kind and genuine and a truly welcoming soul.

Growing up in Rochester, Teresa's vocal talent soon became apparent. Lessons and auditions followed, and Terry graduated from the Julliard School and won the Met auditions as a young woman. But she soon realized that the life of a performer was not for her. After marrying Ben, they put down roots in Plainview and began teaching piano and voice. Theirs was the place to be if one wanted to pursue serious private study – especially classical vocal music. Her repertoire was wide and her knowledge of both technique and performance skills was extensive. Mary and Claudine would be upstairs with Betty who was like another daughter, along with some of the other big kids who watched over the girls. The house was always abuzz with activity until very late at night. Their kitchen was never closed and as I grew into my teens, I became one of the club. Debbie, Fran, Meryl, Betty and the rest of us gathered around the table. The cabinets were searched and Mrs. Arrigo made sure we had plenty to snack on. We kept an eye on the girls and pranced around like we lived there.

In truth, 61 Beaumont Drive was my second home - a safe haven of love, fun and friends with beautiful music as the backdrop. I hung out there several nights a week. Mrs. Arrigo would coach me on whatever audition pieces I was preparing, and she did the same for us all. When the teaching was done for the night, we would sit with her and talk. Advice about boys, cooking, clothes or relationships with our parents — nothing was off limits. It was a place where we could be open and feel unconditionally loved and accepted.

Mrs. Arrigo shared stories about her own personal pain and disappointment about not being able to conceive but also about how much she loved her daughters. Her Catholic faith was central to her being and she became a constant presence at this very church.

In life, Terry inspired love of music, laughter and trust. She enabled us to be open with our feelings and she advised all the girls to be safe and not to trust the boys too much! She was known to speak her mind, but she was also a most loyal confidente who listened with an open heart. Many people are described as giving, but Terry was the quintessential generous spirit. When my father lost everything and we could no longer afford lessons, she called me into her studio. 'I have been waiting to tell you, this," she said. "You have won a scholarship for free voice lessons!" I never paid for another lesson with Mrs. Arrigo. Similar stories have been shared with me by others. Betty recalls Mrs. Arrigo buying her every single audition dress that she wore. She thought nothing of travelling with us to accompany us on piano at auditions — always without any fee. When my brother went to study at Eastman, she made sure that Peter and Marie, her Aunt and Uncle, invited him regularly for dinner at their home in Rochester as though he was part of the family.

For so many of us, she was a second mother, and yet, she also became close to both of my parents and welcomed them into her home. She cooked alongside me for their surprise anniversary party and invited us to dinner before I left for college. Mrs. Arrigo sang at every concert I asked her to perform in and she became the soprano in my High Holiday quartet at Temple Beth David for decades. Our duet on Yom Kippur was known as a highlight of the service until she was almost ninety years old. Each year, after we sang that duet at my lectern, we would hug and kiss one another in front of the congregation, and she would tell me she loved me. I said it back, but today, I wish I had said it so many more days for I will miss her for the rest of my life. Terry will always be remembered when we hear "Un Bel Di" or "Vissi D'arte", when we eat a lasagna, or care for a puppy or a kitten and when we give freely with abandon. When we teach or when we sing and always when we love, we will think of her.

Our sages teach that the timing of events is never accidental. Rather, within the cycle of time and days, there is meaning. Mrs. Arrigo passed away just after Thanksgiving. It was a time when our nation paused in gratitude for the many gifts with which we have been blessed. And so, it was with her life.

To all of you who remember someone you loved, may their memory etch a place inside you that it may bring light in dark times and may the memory of the righteous always be for a blessing at the beginning of the year and when it ends and for all. May this year bring a new message of hope and love for us all.

A Burbank Hanukkah

Growing up in the North San Fernando Valley in the 1950's was a somewhat unique experience. We had hills behind our house that abounded with wildlife; lizards, horned toads, rattle snakes and the occasional coyote. It was a great place to play and experience nature face to

face. Our neighborhood was one of those with laid down post war housing. Our neighbors and their families were Vets of WW2 or Korea. There was a comradery amongst the kids whose families were all scraping along on fairly low wages. We didn't know any better, so it didn't matter.

Then came the Christmas season. Every house on the block was festooned with colorful lights and plastic Santas.....except ours. In school we began preparing for the big Christmas Assembly learning "Away in the Manger" and "Silent Night" with a passion. I don't think we had the obligatory Dreidel song. At home we had a wooden Star of David we covered with foil in front of the fireplace as my parents attempted to create some sense of inclusion for us.

Nevertheless, it was clear that somehow, we were different than everyone else. There wasn't any sense of antisemitism. Rather, the neighborhood was simply oblivious to the fact there were some who didn't recognize or relate to their holiday.

Fast forward about seventy years and I still have that mildly discordant feeling when this season rolls around. What sustains me today is being engaged in a community that illustrates all that is best about our heritage. I am glad Temple Beth David will be here for future generations to provide a pathway for full engagement in our Jewish culture.


