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Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth Klafter

Dear Friends,

As Rabbi Halpern also wrote in this month's HaKol, we approach the High Holidays and the year 5786 with mixed emotions. As Ecclesiastes teaches us: "For everything there is a season and a time for every purpose under heaven." One of the mar-

vels of our Jewish tradition is the recognition that our lives are constantly a balance between seemingly opposing sentiments. From the sanctity and serenity of Yom Kippur, we turn, almost immediately, to the celebration of Sukkot. At the moment of great joy under the chuppah, we break a glass to remind us of times and places of destruction and brokenness in our history and in our world. On Saturday evenings, when we observe Havdalah, we do so with a twisted candle, reminding us that there are weekdays and there is Shabbat; there is dark and light.

This balance is true for the sacred community of TBD. At this season, there is the joy of the holidays, familiar melodies and traditional words; private introspection and community worship. The cycle of the year begins anew, offering new opportunities and new beginnings. The recent sale of our building to NSSA and the partnership we now share with them is both exciting and energizing, as it secures the future of the congregation in our home on Hauppauge Road. At the same time, there are changes in our physical building underway which are unfamiliar and may feel inconvenient. Still, a new chapter in the long history of our congregation is unfolding. There is much to be thankful for.

There is also the recognition that this will be the final High Holiday season Rabbi Halpern and I will celebrate with you as your clergy. While I look forward to my own new chapter beginning next summer, I do so with mixed emotions. I look forward with joy and with honor to serve as your Senior Rabbi once again. "There is a time for every purpose under heaven," reminds us that moments of joy are sometimes balanced with moments of sadness, too. These are the measure of my love for TBD and for each of you. I will have the opportunity to share more words and reflections in the coming weeks during the holidays. And we have many more months together, to continue to learn and to pray, to celebrate and to comfort one another.

Message from President Ken Marenus

Once again, the New Year is nearly upon us. It's a traditional time for us as individuals to stop and reflect....a time to consider, change and evolve. The same is true for Temple Beth David.

Over the past year we have experienced significant change as it relates to our Temple. We have embarked on a series of transformative events that will reshape how and what we do as a congregation. Our fundamentals and principles remain very much the same, but our physical environment and processes will continue to evolve. We are adapting to the realities of our congregation's size, the nature of the larger community, and the economic challenges that remain.

Over the summer we began the process of adapting our physical space to our new realities, and there is still a lot to do. We want everyone to have input so that the results will be functional and personally meaningful.

So, we once again find ourselves at our yearly crossroads. It's time for each member of Temple Beth David to step up and make their voice heard so that the result will be a Temple that is completely aligned with our needs and who we are at this important crossroads in our history.

Dear Friends,

May this time of endings for us together lead us, as well, on paths of new beginnings and may we be richer for all we have shared.



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
