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Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth Klafter

On the first morning of Rosh HaShanah last month, I shared a favorite Jewish text which comes to my mind again as we approach this month as well.

In Pirke Avot, a section of the Talmud, (5:22) we read:

Ben Bag Bag taught:

Turn it [that is, Torah] over, and [again] turn it over, for all is contained here. Look into it; and become gray and old in it. Do not move away from it for you have no better portion than it.

Like Ben Bag Bag, I also continue to turn the Torah, again and again. And each time I do, I discover something new in a letter, a word, or a dramatic story. (I also noted in my sermon that I have become a bit gray after all these years of turning the scroll.) This month we will unroll the entire Torah scroll as is our custom here at TBD on Simhat Torah. We will see the words and the columns of Hebrew all around us. Simhat Torah will be celebrated on Monday, October 13th. (Yizkor Memorial Service for the festival is at 6:15 pm, followed immediately by Simhat Torah Family Service and Consecration of the New Students in our Religious School at 6:30

As we celebrate the "joy of the Torah," the literal translation of "Simhat Torah," I am reminded of the many times that I am asked by adults and students alike, "Is the Torah true?" My first response is usually, "It depends upon what we mean by 'true."

The most traditional answer is that the Torah is true because God revealed the Torah in its entirety to our teacher and leader, Moses, atop Mount Sinai. Moses then brought God's word down the mountain to deliver it to the Children of Israel. This is the story depicted in the Torah itself in the middle of the book of Exodus. If this is our theological understanding, then all of the words and letters were revealed by God and they are all, therefore, divine and immutable. Thus, the Torah is true, just as it is true that the sky is blue and the sun is hot.

As a Reform Jew and a Reform rabbi, I embrace a different view of the Revelation of Torah. I believe that God inspired Moses and the Children of Israel with the essential messages and meanings of the Torah. The details were written by human beings, inspired by others.

Hello everyone, fall is here! We are past the Holidays. It's time to settle in and continue our journey. There is much to do. Over the past several months we have taken steps to accommodate and align our new situation with NSSA. It's going well. This year, the goals involve fewer tactical and more strategic issues.

What will be the solution to our physical space that will be optimal and affordable?

What do we want in our clergy going forward knowing that we will no longer be able to provide the incredible range of support we have received from Rabbi Klafter and Rabbi Halpern in the past?

How can we streamline and optimize our processes and governance and adapt it to a congregation of our size and in our time?

What kind of financial planning can we do to assure an income stream consistent with our budget?

These are tough questions. We are still in uncharted territory and have not faced issues of this magnitude since our founding in the 1970's. We will need to work together to create a Temple Beth David that meets the needs of our community and our congregation. It's both a challenge and an opportunity. Working together, we can find solutions and emerge with a temple that is stronger and more vibrant than ever.

The stories of the Torah are true in my opinion because they form the foundation of our faith and our shared imaginations across generations.

On Simhat Torah, we complete reading the final words of the Torah in the book of Deuteronomy and immediately read the first words in the book of Genesis. Each week in the New Year, we will read another parsha, portion, as the story of our people and our religion unrolls before our eyes and ears. As Ben Bag Bag taught, "Turn it for all is contained there."

I hope you will join us for some JOY on Monday, October 13th!

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Clergy Reflections by Rabbi Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

With every festival and holiday, at every annual event, I am reminded that it is the last time. It is a strange feeling. For those of us who have known each other for thirty-eight years; we understand that we have shared a lifetime of memories--simchas and undoubtedly sorrows as well.

Sitting at breakfast this morning, Steve and I reminisced yet again about the parody we sang together of "Do You Love Me?" as he concluded the speech he gave during the anniversary celebration. It recounted, Fiddler style, our history and meeting as cantor and congregant twenty-five years prior. Remember at the end when he asked the question as Gary struck those introductory notes and I jumped out of my seat in the pew and leapt onto the bima? He loves to remind me that our duet got the biggest ovation of the night!

These moments are etched in my memory and during the holidays they are especially poignant. I miss so many people from the past and I am grateful to so many of you. Sukkot is just such a reminder for it is the quintessential symbol of the home. And the fragility of the sukkah is a constant that does not let us forget that 'all that we prize is but lent to us.' We are inheritors but only for a time for as the quote goes on to say, 'and the time comes when we must surrender it.'

How do we persevere in the face of the temporal nature of life when illness and death are knocking? I have learned these painful lessons from so many of you. We take hold of the precious moments and let them find an enduring place in our hearts where we will turn for strength.

It is no accident that our Jewish calendar starts the New Year with a vivid reminder of just how fragile life and home and all that we love really is. We share that bond of vulnerability. It is the very essence of our humanity.

But our calendar then takes us to the next level with Simchat Torah. By recounting our people's trials and tribulations as told through reading and rereading Torah, we see through the eyes of our ancestors how to take hold of life and give it purpose and lasting value. As we grow older and feel those inevitable losses creeping up, we also sense an earned wisdom and insight. That is why, on Simchat Torah, we begin to read the whole Torah again from the beginning.

The very same words and stories are seen through our eyes of experience, and we find greater meaning and a deeper understanding.

In this holy season, may we recognize the gifts we have and share them and cherish them. May we reach out and think of others and may we always remember that when we are together we are home.

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
