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Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth Klafter

On the first of October, just a few hours before Yom Kippur began, Dr. Jane Goodall died of natural causes in her sleep while on a speaking tour in California. I spoke of her at the end of my sermon on Yom Kippur morning, reflecting briefly on her life and sharing her own words of poetry.

Our tradition teaches that it is significant when a death comes during the Ten Days of Awe. The very days are imbued with a sacred significance, as we make teshuva, and consider life's greatest questions. Though Dr. Goodall was not Jewish, I would like to believe that there is a connection between the day of her death and our holiest season. Her life was one of mission, driven by her passionate desire to repair and sustain our planet.

Shortly after her death, a program called, "Famous Last Words," was made public. Its producers at Netflix describe, "Earlier this year, Dr. Jane Goodall — a UN Messenger of Peace — sat down for a deeply reflective conversation about her legacy and to immortalise [sic] her final words with the understanding that it would only be shared with the world after she passed." I was profoundly moved by the interview. First, by the concept that she knew her words would be shared after her death, displaying a certain acceptance that the end of her life was approaching. Second, by the message itself which is one of the most meaningful "sermons" I have ever heard or read.

In her closing statement, she shared these words: What message do I want to leave? I want to make sure that you all understand that each and every one of you has a role to play. Your life matters and you are here for a reason. And every single day you live, you make a difference in the world. And you get to choose the difference that you make. Even today, when the planet is dark, there is still hope. Don't lose hope. We have to do everything in our power to make the world a better place for the children alive today and for those that will follow you.

I believe we can each be inspired by her life and her words both personally and as a community. This month, especially, TBD will be making a difference in the world around us, fulfilling our Jewish mission of Tikkun Olam. Ben served on our Board of Trustees and acted as our parliamentarian. He knew so many members of our congregation that he became a fixture at high holiday services. Often, he was the first person to greet us when we arrived and walked down the hallway and into the sanctuary.

Ben was also a member of Brotherhood. He attended meetings and events frequently. In fact, Ben joined us at our first summer planning meeting just a few short months ago. Ben Piskorz was older than the rest of us but that did not stop him from offering his opinion nor engaging in the good-natured teasing that has become a hallmark of when Brotherhood members gather together.

Ben and Regina raised their family at Temple Beth David. His children were long-time members themselves. He was a grandparent several times over. His children and grandchildren graduated from religious school and celebrated their B'nai Mitzvot here many years ago. Why then did he remain an active member of our congregation? What did Temple Beth David offer to Ben Piskorz? Why was a man in his late 80's still an active member of Brotherhood?

Surely, Ben must have felt a spiritual connection. If you knew him, then you would know that he and Regina could be found at their regular location in the pew near the door of the sanctuary. 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
