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Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth Klafter

Hanukkah begins on the 25th of the Hebrew month of Kislev every year. This year we will light the first candle on Sunday evening, December 14th. Please find the blessings in this HaKol. We will enjoy tasty treats cooked in oil – latkes or sufganiyot (doughnuts) - as a reminder of the leg-

end about the oil in the Temple which was relit when the Temple was rededicated. And, of course, we play dreidel!

The four letters on the dreidel here in North America and everywhere outside of the land of Israel are: Nun, Gimel, Hey, Shin, standing for: Nes (miracle), Gadol (great), Hayah (happened) and Sham (there): "A Great Miracle Happened There." In Israel, the last letter is Pey, for Po (here): "A Great Miracle Happened Here.

There is also another explanation for these four letters on the sides of the dreidel. They are said to represent four empires which sought to control the Jewish community during our history:

- Nun represents the Hebrew word, nefesh (soul) which was severed when the Holy Temple was destroyed by the Babylonian Empire.
- Gimel represents the Hebrew word, guf (body) which was threatened by the kingdoms of Persia and Media.
- The Hey, is for the word, hakol (all) considered the Roman exile, a summation of all other exiles. [Note that this word, hakol is not the same HaKol, the name of this monthly bulletin which means, "The Voice."]
- The last letter, the Shin represents the attack on the sechel (wisdom) of Israel, by the Greeks.

Thus, the dreidel can teach us lessons of our people's history and tradition. And playing dreidel with coins or candy adds fun and joy to the holiday. One year when I was a teenager growing up at Temple Beth El in Great Neck, I decided that if a little dreidel could bring some fun, then surely a giant dreidel could bring a giant dose of joy! Here I am with the giant dreidel I created for a temple holiday celebration (see photo).

Surely this season, we need lots of fun and joy. I pray that we are reminded of miracles and the blessings of joy and celebration this Hanukkah.

Movin' On

As we come to the close of the calendar year 2025, it's a good time to bring everyone up to date about the projects we are actively moving ahead with behind the scenes. First, congratulations to Margie Gursky and the Religious School Committee. They are off to a good start this year with classes running smoothly and events happening frequently. It's great to know that our school now has more than 100 students and is growing. This is important be-

cause it represents the future of our Congregation. These young families will form the basis of our leadership for years to come.

The Constitution Committee, led by David Gaines, is working its way steadily through the existing document. They have made many suggestions for modernization and improvement of our foundational processes. They still have some distance to go, but the work is solid thus far and will bring about significant clarification and efficiency. Their progress is being shared with our Board and will be brought to the Congregation for approval early in 2026.

Our steering committee is now focused on how to optimize and modernize our physical space. A fundamental plan for offices and school rooms is evolving. The committee is also now thinking about our sanctuary and its modernization. This involves a lot of effort by Beverly Wolcott, Art Salander, Bill Ackerman, Laura and Bill Joseph and others. Once we get to a point where design and costs are approximated, the plan will come to the Board and then the congregation. Please look for this early next year as well.

Finally, our excellent pulpit committee is well on the way to identifying what we want in our next clergy. This small committee is composed of three past presidents and congregants of a variety of ages and interests to make sure we are considering the needs of our entire congregation. Led by Beverly Wolcott, the committee has completed and submitted the extensive application to the CCAR (Rabbi's Organization) which will be sending us candidates, early next year. This committee has done the hard work and provided insight on who we are and the direction we want to take going forward.

As you can see, there is a lot going on behind the scenes at Temple Beth David. We are all looking forward to continuing our journey together in 2026.

It feels like the season of lasts: the last month of the year; the final year as your rabbis, the last Chanukah we will share and so on. If I sound melancholy, well, I suppose I am – at least a bit.

Our dog Finn has been diagnosed with lung cancer. It comes after a long and wonderful life; a pampered life and many medical problems for which he has been treated with

the very best care available. Finn has more Manhattan specialists than I do – and thank goodness he also has better health insurance. Steve spares no expense when it comes to his little boy. Just to give you an idea of their bond, Finn's nickname is 'boyfriend.' This little Cavapoo came to us at six weeks old after Rachel worked her magic on us through begging and coercion and before we knew it, we had a new little white, fluffy member of the family.

Now, I must confess, I am not a dog person. I don't walk him; I don't feed him and only occasionally do I even pet him or put out his fresh morning water. Steve, on the other hand, takes him to work every day and will not even take a vacation for more than two nights since Finn has been diagnosed. The lights of this season remind us of our connection, our history and the continuity that brings us comfort even as we face the vicissitudes of life. To all of you, my dear friends, on this last Chanukah we will share together, my prayer is that we will always see the light in the darkness and remember the precious years spent together. SIMCHAS AND NACHAS

We are starting a new column in *Hakol* to bring a bit more community to our TBD family. "Simchas and Nachas" will include happy news from our TBD family. 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Hanukkah Blessings

Candles are added to the hanukkiyah (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. On the Shabbat of Hanukkah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the shamash (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Hanukkah lights. As you do, say or sing:

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Hanukkah.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Hanukkah lights.

בַּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶךְ הַעוֹלָם, שֵׁעַשָּׁה נִסִּים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ וָאָמוֹתֵינוּ בַּיַמִים הַהֶּם בַּזְּמֵן הַזָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim baz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

For first night only:

בַּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁהֶחֱיָנוּ וְקִיְּמָנוּ וָהְגִּיעַנוּ לַזִּמֵן הַזֶּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higiyanu laz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who has kept us alive, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

Hanerot Halalu

We kindle these lights because of the wondrous deliverance You performed for our ancestors. During these eight days of Hanukkah, these lights are sacred; we are not to use them but only to behold them, so that their glow may rouse us to give thanks for Your wondrous acts of deliverance.
